Dear Representative McCarthy:

The undersigned California organizations, representing a wide variety of business, labor, faith and immigrant communities from across the state, are urging you to communicate a very simple message to your colleagues at the July 10 meeting of the Republican Conference: Californians deserve a vote on citizenship.

On June 27, 2013, Americans saw proof that it's still possible for bipartisanship to overcome political gridlock when 68 U.S. Senators, both Republicans and Democrats, voted overwhelmingly to reform our broken immigration system with a pathway to citizenship for immigrant families. The Senate recognized that fixing our immigration system is more than a moral imperative; the enactment of immigration reform in the short and long term is good for our economy, and would reduce the national debt. The independent Congressional Budget Office (CBO) released its score estimating that fixing our broken immigration system will reduce federal deficits by about \$200 billion over the next 10 years, and about \$700 billion in the second decade. The CBO also found that commonsense immigration reform will increase real GDP by 3.3% in 2023, and 5.4% in 2033. Lastly, the CBO indicates that S.744 would reduce undocumented immigration by 33-50%.

California is one of the most diverse states in the country and represents the growth and vibrancy that our nation was founded on. In the last 20 years, 9 out of 10 voters who have registered to vote have been Latino or Asian. A new Field Poll conducted in February shows that an extraordinary 90 percent of California voters now favor letting undocumented immigrants who have lived here for a number of years stay and become citizens if they have a job, learn English and pay back taxes. All Californians rely on their Congress members to represent them responsibly. This foremost includes tackling the most difficult challenges facing our nation, like reforming our immigration laws.

Californians are known for hard work, ingenuity and pragmatism. We tackle problems head on. As a party leader, we expect you to take these California values to your Conference meeting on July 10 and urge your colleagues to take a vote on the pathway to citizenship in the House of Representatives this summer. 11 million workers, small business owners, along with their family and colleagues are counting on your leadership.
