- 1. Alysia Bonner reported on the SEJ Summit. Although everything went wrong that could have; it was still a real success. She thanked admin, the SEJ Committee and Caucuses for all their work. <u>President's Report:</u> Gwyn reported that she has been in the trenches working to win in Morgan Hill. It is an uphill battle, but we do have a chance. There will be a Robo Call teleconference call on Thursday. The Member Political Organizers are working hard in the Regions. The Robo Call is to get all the Regions together and on the same page.

Gwyn attended a meeting/rally at West Heading in Santa Clara for Fight for \$15. About 15+ people spoke. There was a push, since San Jose has approved the Fight for \$15 Ordinance, for Non-Profits to follow the Ordinance. There are grants available to help Non-Profits follow the Ordinance.

#### Chief Elected Officer's Report: Kristy Sermersheim

**Morgan Hill Unified School District:** Because of the work being done in Morgan Hill, Kristy said that she can now walk around in Morgan Hill wearing purple.

**Member Against Member Charges:** The Local has received several charges from Santa Clara County. We will need to figure out rules in 2017 for handling units where Supervisors are a part of our membership. Fresno members believe they are handling these relationships well, but Santa Clara is not.

Kristy feels her major job between now and the end of January is to develop processes for the new CEO. One thing that we will institute is providing a listing of open contracts. Another is to provide each month in Executive Session a listing of Member Against Member charges and a list of lawsuits pending.

Matt Nathanson reported that there will possibly be a strike vote for Santa Cruz Court workers (about 90 workers) on November 1<sup>st</sup>. Their contract expires on the 31<sup>st</sup>. There was a last minute proposal from management that caused the court workers to walk out of negotiations this week. It is contracted that retirees receive medical benefits. The employer has not been budgeting for this benefit. The proposal was that the court workers are to pay \$900 a year toward this benefit. They are set to bargain again on Thursday. If there is no agreement, the vote on November 1<sup>st</sup> is likely to be a strike authorization vote.

<u>Background</u>: None of the candidates seeking election to the vacant Local 521 CEO position has experience running the day to day operations of a union. Therefore, no matter who wins, the incumbent will need assistance learning the responsibilities of the position. It is strongly suggested that we set the new CEO up for success by offering a "Transition Team" to help him/her for at least their first two months/until a plan is set up and in place with the staff infrastructures.

I have the necessary CEO experience and at the request of the new CEO, would offer my assistance to the Local as a member of this "Transition" Team.

For about a year the Local has had the benefit, at no expense to the Local, of a very high level International employee to help the Local with training and covering vacated leader staff positions across the Local. Currently she is covering both the Chief of Staff and Organizing Director positions. She, Mary Grillo, will be retiring from the International February 15, 2017, and would then be willing and available to help the Local as the second member of this "Transition" Team.

Both Kristy and Mary would work as Consultants for up to 10 days a month as requested by the CEO/Local; Kristy at a negotiated CEO rate and Mary at a negotiated COS rate.

For these two months, the costs to cover compensating Kristy and Mary would come from the already budgeted amounts for the vacated Chief of Staff and Organizing Director positions.

Agreement to Sublease a portion of the Building on 2302 Zanker Road Between SEIU 521 (Leaseholder) and SEIU 2015 (Subtenant)

1. Seiu 2015 will pay the rent to sublease their portion of the premises from the transition of the workers (September 1 2015) to Dec 31 2016 as previously agreed. 521 will invoice SEIU 2015 in a separate document (enclosed).

#### EXTENSION OF SUBLEASE AGREEMENT ZANKER ROAD

Term: January 1, 2017 to August 31, 2018

- 1. Seiu 2015 will occupy for their full use, 24 hours a day, the following:
  - a. 6 adjacent cubicles, with attached lockable cabinets on the south side of the Zanker office.
  - b. One lockable senior staff office, with detached desk and cabinet, located near to the 2015 cubicles
- 2. Seiu 2015 also have the intermittent use of the following areas:
  - a. The Great Room for large meetings every Friday (unless necessary by either party to reschedule occasionally) with 30 days' notice.
  - Either the Strategic or Public Health meeting rooms for staff and smaller meetings. (seating 8 to 10 people at a large table) at least once a week for meetings)
  - c. Sufficient parking available to local 2015 staff and members on a first come first serve basis, However, should there be a meeting or function that will exceed the normal parking level or otherwise disrupt the Landlord's parking or 521's parking, Local 2015 will notify 521 at least 30 days in advance, and such approval shall not be unreasonably withheld.
  - d. The Strategic Conference room for pre-scheduled meetings (maximum approximately 10 people)
  - e. The upstairs training room as a substitute for the Great Room or as an addition, as scheduled and reserved.

- f. Three additional cubicles located next to the 2015 cubicles available regularly for members to watch training videos. We will also furnish at no additional cost 3 or 4 old but adequate computers for members to use to watch the training videos.
- g. The area in front of the cubicles for a "secondary lobby area" for homecare workers, retirees, or others.

Additional services for Local 2015 from Local 521.

- 1. 521 will provide normal janitorial services (cleaning, vacuuming, trash pickup from the cubicles and meeting rooms.) Local 2015 is responsible for set up and breakdown and leaving the rooms in the same state they were found in.
- 521 will provide toilet papers and paper towels in all the bathrooms, during normal usage. If the subtenant wishes to hold a conference over a weekend multiple day training, they will be responsible for reimbursing or purchasing such items.
- 3. The staff of Local 2015 may use either the upstairs or the downstairs kitchen for a staff kitchen, and for assembling food stuff for member meetings. Should the use of coffee, filtered water and tea become more than de minimis, 521 will ask for reimbursement or limit the usage.
- 4. Three phones, a separate phone line
- 5. 521 will improve the entry sign as approved by City Team, the Landlords of the property, and add SEIU 2015, if they approve. (We will discuss this with Lupe Martinez as work on the sign progresses.) 521 will produce improved temporary signs for 2015 for directions to meeting rooms etc., and will require their usage.

Requirements of Local 2015 as subtenants

#### IT & Internet Policy:

SEIU Local 521's electronic mail systems and Internet connections must not be used in an offensive, unlawful, or inappropriate manner or in a manner disruptive to the work of any employee. In general, material -- including language, pictures, video, and sound -- that would be offensive in person is equally offensive when depicted on a computer screen, contained in an electronic mail message, or posted on an electronic bulletin board.

Use of the electronic email systems and Internet connections must be consistent with SEIU Local 521 Sexual Harassment policy. Offensive use of these resources include, but are not limited to: viewing or sending sexually explicit or obscene material, using these resources to threaten, defame, or harass any person, or to view or send material that disparages any person on the basis of race, ethnicity, national origin, sexual orientation, age, religion, gender, or disability.

You must obtain permission from the Information Technology dept before downloading any software from the Internet or otherwise to ensure that the software is compatible with SEIU Local 521 system and the software used by SEIU Local 521 appropriately licensed. Employees may not download or otherwise transmit any copyrighted material through SEIU Local 521 computer system.

Employees must not monitor or access messages not sent to or intended for them, or attempt to do so, without expressed permission.

SEIU will not assume any liability for any claim, suit, criminal prosecution, or judgment against any user of its computer and email system or its Internet connections because of any action by him or her in the course of such use.

Under the Digital Millennium Copyright Act, distribution of copyright materials is punishable by law. Those found guilty of copyright infringement may face the following penalties:

- Up to five years in jail
- Fines and charges of up to \$150,000 per file
- In addition to any other charges that might be brought against you, the copyright holder can file suit, which can result in legal fees and damages that must be paid.

Recent cases have resulted in judgments against the person distributing the files for up to \$80,000 per file.

# ANTI-HARASSMENT POLICY AND ANTI-DISCRIMINATION AND COMPLAINT PROCEDURE

#### **Purpose**

SEIU Local 521 is committed to providing a work environment that is free from all forms of discrimination and harassment. Our goal is to strive for a productive and pleasant working environment based on mutual respect and that reflects the highest level of ethical and lawful conduct.

#### **Scope**

This policy applies to all SEIU Local 521, managers, supervisors, employees, applicants, and members. This policy applies at all SEIU Local 521 locations; Local 521 sponsored social or other events, as well as activities at which you represent SEIU Local 521.

#### **Policy**

SEIU Local 521 strictly prohibits any unwelcome conduct in the workplace that is based on an individual's age, ancestry, citizenship, color, marital status, national origin, political affiliation, pregnancy, childbirth or related medical conditions, race, religion, gender, gender identity, sexual orientation, military or veterans' status, physical or mental medical condition unrelated to the person's ability to perform the job, or the perception that a person has any of the above characteristics, or that the person is associated with a person who has, or is perceived to have, any of the above characteristics, or any other basis protected by Federal, state, Local law, ordinance, or regulation.

Additionally, SEIU Local 521 will not tolerate our outside vendors or consultants harassing any employee.

Any employee found to violate this policy will be subject to disciplinary action up to and including termination of employment.

#### **Prohibited Conduct**

Harassment includes any unwelcome verbal, physical or visual conduct that denigrates, shows hostility or aversion toward an individual or his/her relatives, friends or associates because of a particular protected status. Harassing conduct also has the purpose or effect of substantially interfering with an individual's work performance, or creating an intimidating, hostile or offensive working environment or otherwise affecting an individual's employment opportunities. Examples of prohibited conduct include: epithets, slurs, negative stereotyping and written/graphic material or jokes that show hostility or prejudice.

Sexual harassment refers to behavior of a sexual nature that is unwelcome and personally offensive to its recipients. It can also be behavior that is simply abusive, with no sexual elements, if it is directed at an individual because of his or her sex. Harassment may be overt or subtle and involves any conduct that makes someone uncomfortable being at work. For example, behavior that may be acceptable in a social setting may not be appropriate in the workplace. In addition, sexual or gender harassment can be by a person of either the same or opposite sex. This policy also forbids harassment based upon a person's perceived gender—meaning that gender that they elect to adopt.

Unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favor; and other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature constitute "sexual harassment" when either explicitly or implicitly.

Submission to conduct is made as a term or condition of employment; [hiring, compensation, promotion or retention]. Submission to or rejection of such conduct is used as a basis for decisions concerning that individual's employment or engagement; It unreasonably interferes with an employee's job performance; or creates an intimidating, hostile or offensive work environment.

Examples of prohibited conduct also include, but are not limited to:

<u>Verbal</u>: Innuendoes, slurs, sexually suggestive comments, jokes of a sexual nature, or jokes based on the protected characteristics (whether actual, perceived or by association), threats, unwanted social invitations, lewd or derogatory comments, racial epithets, insults, sexual advances or requests for sexual favors.

<u>Non-Verbal</u>: Sexually suggestive objects or pictures, graphic commentaries, suggestive or insulting sounds, leering, whistling, or obscene gestures, offensive materials sent via e-mail or internet.

<u>Physical</u>: Unwanted physical contact of a sexual nature, including sexually suggestive or offensive touching, brushing up against the body, pinching or coerced sexual intercourse, hitting or pushing, blocking or impeding movement.

Complaint Procedure: All allegations of harassment and discrimination will be taken seriously. SEIU Local 521 encourages all employees to report any incidents of harassment forbidden by this policy immediately so that complaints can be quickly and fairly resolved. If you find conduct in the workplace to be unwelcome or offensive, you may immediately inform the person engaging in the conduct in a clear and unambiguous manner that the conduct is unwelcome or offensive and that you want the conduct to stop. However, if you are uncomfortable taking this action or if the conduct does not cease after you have warned the offending person(s) to stop, you should immediately bring the subject to the attention of your immediate supervisor, or, in the case of an applicant for employment who believes that he or she has been sexually harassed, he or she should immediately bring the subject directly to the attention of the Training Director,

Assistant to President, or Administrative Director. You are welcome to have union representation.

Once a complaint is made, Local 521 will undertake a prompt investigation ensuring confidentiality to the maximum extent possible. Inquiries and/or complaints will be investigated by Training Director, Assistant to President, or Administrative Director (or other impartial designee), if appropriate. In the event the Local hears of a complaint through a third party and the complaint involves a bargaining unit member, the Union will be notified by Local 521. You are welcome to have union representation.

Should a bargaining employee choose not to have Union representation during the process, Local 521 will request that the employee acknowledge in writing his/her desire not to involve the union. A bargaining unit employee who exercises this option may change his/her mind at any stage in the proceedings and have full union representation.

All directors, managers, supervisors and employees have an obligation to cooperate with an investigation. Should the investigation result in a finding of misconduct, Local 521 will take appropriate remedial and/or disciplinary action. Any employee found to have engaged in harassment or discrimination will be subject to disciplinary action up to and including immediate discharge.

Any director, manager or supervisor who is aware of any possible violation of this policy and fails to notify management or Training Director, Assistant to President, or Administrative Director will be subject to discipline up to and including discharge.

You also should be aware that the Federal Equal Employment Opportunity Commission and the California Department of Fair Employment and Housing investigate and prosecute complaints of prohibited harassment in employment.

If you think you have been harassed or that you have been retaliated against for it resisting or complaining, you may file a complaint with the appropriate agency. The nearest office is listed in the telephone book.

SEIU Local 521 will not tolerate any reprisals or retaliation against any employee who reports known or suspected prohibited harassment or for appropriately initiating or assisting in any investigation or action or proceeding resulting from a harassment investigation. Local 521 recognizes that false accusations of harassment can have serious effects on innocent individuals. We trust all of our employees will act responsibly to establish and maintain a pleasant and productive working environment, free of discrimination and harassment.

3. Should there become a time when the 2 unions do not agree on endorsements for one or more SEIU proposition, or local, state or federal candidate, or a referendum, measure or proposition etc., Local 2015 will not display signs, or use the common areas (meeting rooms as listed above or the cubicles used for video training) for campaigning for the opposing candidate or issue.

#### Costs and conditions

- 1. Local 2015 will pay \$6000.00 each month in advance for each month beginning February 2017 and pay the January 2017 rent before the March 2017 payment. Payments over 20 days late must include a 3% late fee.
- Local 2015 will provide its own insurance for accidents or incidents that occur during
  meetings to members and or staff, as well as special one day insurance when
  required for special events. Local 521 is not responsible for such expenses or
  incidents.
